Limerick City is a Wild Atlantic Way Gateway City, brimming with history and stories to tell. It is the third largest city in Ireland (after Dublin and Cork).

Discover the rich history and vibrant culture from King John's Castle to St. Mary's Cathedral, one of Limerick's oldest buildings. Take in a tour of the iconic Thomond Park Rugby Stadium; sample local foods and crafts at Limerick's Milk Market, a staple of Limerick-city life since 1852; or visit Adare, Ireland's prettiest village and home to the Ryder Cup in 2027.

Limerick has a fascinating past, stunning countryside and is overflowing with culture. Limerick City and its surrounding areas have a wealth of fantastic accommodation, venues and experiences to offer any delegate.

You can sign up to visit the key historic Limerick sites (*when registering*) for the 40-minute walking tour of Limerick city on Wednesday 17th June, as part of our welcome reception. The walking tour is optional and it is followed by a Bar-b-que by the River Shannon with traditional Irish music entertainment.

Local Limerick Attractions

Treaty City Brewery Treaty City Brewery is located in the medieval quarter of Limerick city in a historical building that dates back over 250 years. Guests can experience a working brewery, they can see beer being brewed and learn about the history, before enjoying a complimentary beer tasting as part of the tour which takes approximately an hour.

The Hunt Museum The Hunt Museum houses an important collection of 2,000 original works of art and antiquity. Explore one of Ireland's greatest private collections dating from the Neolithic to the 20th Century.

The People's Museum of Limerick Get up close and personal with the city's past at The People's Museum of Limerick, a new museum housed in a beautifully restored Georgian townhouse. The museum aims to reflect the diverse lives of the people, buildings and streets of Limerick city. It showcases the eclectic and fascinating collection of items in the care of Limerick Civic Trust as well as artefacts that are visiting from elsewhere.

The Milk Market Despite being called the 'Milk Market', you'll find all sorts of goodies in this Aladdin's cave for foodies and anyone seeking quality, value and

the occasional touch of the unusual. This bustling, colourful market is the oldest weekly market in the country and is a must visit experience for foodies, a place to explore, soak up the buzz, discover new flavours and savour the unique vibe of this busy market. You'll discover the very best of fresh, natural produce from great farmhouse cheeses and chutneys, artisan meats, organic fruit and vegetables to delicious healthy breads and fresh pressed juices.

Thomond Park Stadium Tour and Museum This famous venue, renowned internationally for its unique history and atmosphere, boasts a capacity of 25,600. As home to Munster Rugby, its award-winning design and structure incorporating symmetrical grandstands on the east and west sides makes it a truly unique landmark in the city. The stadium is a multipurpose venue with conference facilities, museum and stadium tours for rugby and sports fans alike.

Limerick Whiskey Experience Located in the heart of Limerick City, Limerick Whiskey Experience was founded to provide an enjoyable guest experience, delivered in the comfortable surroundings of Peggy's Parlour. Through a combination of passion, experience and education guests are welcomed to learn how local ingredients and traditional production methods impact the flavours of whiskey and more importantly how to sample whiskey for taste and quality.
